Fatima is one of the leaders of the Water Committee we launched in the village of Byasa in Somalia. She is just treating a shallow well with chlorine.

Meet **Maryan**, living in a village in Jowhar in Somalia. "I am a single mother of five. I have a small farm. I plant corn. I also have two cows that give milk. When the drought came, there was no water for us nor for the animals. My cows were on the verge of death, the crops died. PAH started to deliver water by trucks. I got 80 liters a day - 20 liters I gave to the cows, the rest for my family to drink, cook and wash. The cows ate the dried corn and they are again giving milk, with which I feed my children. Thank God we are safe now".
